Message for the Month

A very warm welcome to October's edition of the parish magazine. I trust you had a good break over the summer and a chance to rest. Of all the things that have arisen during the pandemic, there are two which I'd like to reflect on as we look ahead to the autumn.

The first is **the new opportunities we've had to share our faith**. I say 'new' because undoubtedly, people are seeking answers to some big questions which have been prompted by COVID-19. For some, it's questioning the existence of God and if God does exist, asking where He is in the midst of such widespread suffering. For others, it's more personal. Confronted by challenging circumstances in their own lives, they are looking to the church for help and guidance. These opportunities are also 'new' because we have had to find alternative ways of communicating with one another. Physical meetings are no longer the norm and instead the internet and social media platforms play a big part in how we interact with each other and how Christians share the hope they have in Jesus.

At St Mark's, we shall be endeavouring to make the most of these new opportunities to share our faith by way of our **Alpha course** which starts on **Thursday**, **24**th **September**. As the name suggests, Alpha is a way into the Christian faith which introduces people to who Jesus is, the claims He made about Himself and why millions of people worship Him as the Saviour of the world.

The course is via Zoom and will last an hour a week for ten weeks. You can find more details on our website and on page 4 of this magazine. It could just answer some of the questions you have about our current circumstances, about life or about God. And if you're reading this after 24th September, please do join us anyway. You can catch up very easily, so don't worry about missing the first couple of sessions! I look forward to seeing you there.

The second thing which has characterised the pandemic is **uncertainty about the future**. The last few weeks have proved the point. Just as we thought the outbreak of new cases remained steady, there has suddenly been a sharp increase, leading of course, to fresh restrictions. Who knows what might happen next?

Uncertainty can be very disarming and has the potential to fill us with fear. But it need not. Indeed, it can be one of the ways God invites us to draw close to Him, so that we might come to know His peace and provision.

I'm reminded of God's call on Abram's life (before he became Abraham). Abram had no idea where God was calling him, but he obediently followed nonetheless and God graciously led him to the Promised Land, a place of bounty and blessing.

On **Saturday**, **3**rd **October**, we will be holding **a Day of Prayer** specifically to try and discern what God might be calling us to in the future, both as individuals and as a church. How might He want us to use our gifts and experience hereon in, what have we learnt from lockdown that might shape our future and what's God saying about our direction of travel as His people?



There'll be a chance to delve into Scripture, seek inspiration at some designated prayer stations in church and get creative and interactive with prayer as well.

If you don't receive our fortnightly updates by e-mail, please drop me a line, so you can be included. It's a great opportunity to be involved in the new thing God is doing. Moreover, like Abram and countless millions since, it's a reminder that God has our best interests at heart, good plans for our future and is faithful to lead us to a better place.

The Sermon

Sunday 16th August Speaker Sharon Yates Theme The Bible

Today we can open a bible any where, any time, and in any format. We have the blessing of easy access to the Bible. But why is it important? In Revelation 22 v 4 it says 'They will see his face' - this is at the end of our journey to God. The scripture are part of our journeying in faith to the Lord, and during that journey we need to immerse ourselves in the scriptures to read about God, to know him deeper and the way we should live in our relationship with God. There are three things that show us why we should trust in the bible to lead us in our relationship with God.

- 1. Prophets seeing the different revelations God gave them at that time, which came true many years later.
- 2. Apostles if you encountered the apostles today, and asked them how they know so much about Jesus—they were eye witnesses.
- 3. Jesus He offers something else that no one else has done before or since: his sacrifice for us showing unconditional love (Galatians 1 v 4), so we could be rescued and see the face of God.

Trust in a living God who across the centuries has revealed his ways in the scripture; all scripture is God breathed and useful (2 Timothy 3). Trust in a living God who sent his son to rescue us, and whose life on earth was recorded by eye witnesses. Jesus says that man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God (Matthew 4).

In a modern world when we are subject to rapid communications we can easily be diverted, but we should be hungry for the word of God. As a church family we need to make the Bible central to our lives. There is much around that would deceive and distract us; modern life places much emphasis on self worth, and we supposedly have the answers within. That's not enough; the answer does not lie within us but lies with God, He has the answers and the truth. Our future cannot be found in our practices but sitting at the feet of Jesus, doing the one thing that is necessary.

Moral Questions from the Pandemic

You may have missed it at the time. The movie 'Contagion' didn't make much of an impact when it was released for public viewing in 2011. Perhaps it was thought to be unrealistic. It was about a highly contagious, unknown virus, transmitted by an infected bat to a pig in a Chinese marketplace. From there it spread like wildfire round the world.

It was fiction then of course, but not so far-fetched as to be distant from reality, as we now know. Deadly viruses and the plagues they cause have been part of world history since time began. In the early days when travel between continents was infrequent, their spread was slower and usually confined to local regions.

The way the film's imaginary plot develops bears an uncanny resemblance to what we have experienced this year. Panic buying empties supermarkets, whole populations adopt social distancing, scientists work flat out to identify the virus and then search for a means to combat it. Meanwhile millions are infected, and quarantines are imposed.

The story progresses far beyond the reality which is familiar to us. The irresponsible use of social media and false rumours of a cure lead to the looting of pharmacies. Emergency food supplies are ransacked, law and order break down. Troops police the streets. Then there's a breakthrough: a vaccine is discovered. But that raises a new moral problem: who will get it first and what would be a fair distribution system?


The movie is still available via Netflix, or you can buy a DVD online. Despite the inevitable carnage of the pandemic and the suffering it portrays, it contrives to have a relatively happy ending.

In real life, we haven't got that far yet. But, please God, we will. After all, most deadly diseases are now under control and both vaccination and immunisation are part and parcel of everyday life; old 'uns take it for granted that their GP will summon them for an anti-flu jab each winter.

But we may face an ethical dilemma when it comes to a vaccine for Covid-19. If there's an initial shortage, who should get it first? Should money come into it? Are Christian principles applicable?

China

In April, the government of a town in the northern province of Shanxi, called officials from all villages under its jurisdiction for a meeting. The participants were ordered to remove crosses, religious symbols and images from the homes of people of faith who receive social welfare payments and replace them with portraits of Chairman Mao and President Xi Jinping. The officials were instructed to annul the subsidies to those who protest the order.

Other locations also appear to be enacting this policy. A disabled Christian living in Jiangxi Province had their minimum living subsidy and monthly disability allowance similarly cancelled. Another account from Jiangxi described a Three-Self church member in her 80s who uttered, "Thank God" after receiving her monthly 200 RMB subsidy. She was removed

from the government aid list. Another believer in Henan, a widow with two boys in her care, refused to sign a statement renouncing her faith. Her allowance was stopped. Another elderly woman in her 70s, also in Henan Province, had her living allowance and poverty alleviation subsidy cancelled after officials saw an image of a cross on her door.

Strict laws and the recent closure of a number of churches by the authorities have made it very difficult for believers to meet together for worship.


The Bible Society asks us to pray for Rezki who is committed to leading Bible work in Algeria and for the Church in Algeria.

St Marks is again taking part in the *Link to Hope Shoe Box Appeal*, which delivers boxes to Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria and Ukraine in time for Christmas. There are two types of shoeboxes you can make up - The **Family Shoebox and** the **Elderly Shoebox** - although only one leaflet (**leaflets available from Julie**).

The Shoebox contents are similar and this year they have asked that <u>each box should contain</u> – gloves/hat, sweets/chocolate (BB June 2021), soap and flannel, toothbrush/toothpaste, candles and holder, small games (travel size dominoes etc, playing cards).

Church of England News



The Revd Canon Dr Chigor Chike has been appointed as the Church of England's interim National Adviser Minority Ethnic Anglican Concerns as work begins to establish a new body to combat racism.

Dr Chike, who is the vicar of Emmanuel Church, Forest Gate, East London and chair of the Anglican Minority Ethnic Network

(AMEN), is taking on the role as a secondment for six months. Based in Church House, Westminster, Dr Chike will be part of the Mission and Public Affairs (MPA) department.

This is ahead of a permanent appointment of a replacement for Dr Elizabeth Henry, who retired this year after seven years as National Adviser to the Committee for Minority Ethnic Anglican Concerns (CMEAC). It will be a crucial period, which will see preparations for the establishment of a new Archbishops' Racism Action Commission.

Dr Chike, who has degrees from Oxford and Birmingham and is author of numerous books, has been based in his East London church since 2010. He is also chair of the Rights and Equalities in Newham charity, advocating for marginalised people. He said: "I am really looking forward to the secondment to the role of National Adviser Minority Ethnic Anglican Concerns.

"I have worked in the field of anti-racism for the past twenty-five years and do not know a time when people have been more aware of systemic racism or more determined to dismantle it.

"I would be looking to play a part to the Church of England's response to this moment."



Word for Today

Radical Commitment

Give up your own way, take up your cross daily, and follow me.'

Luke 9 v 23

Here are three Bible examples of radical commitment:

- 1) Commitment on the job. In the past, employers appreciated their workers, and workers valued their employers and their jobs. Today's workplace is often adversarial, with employees criticising their bosses and doing the minimum required to get by, while many bosses have become increasingly demanding, taking their workers for granted. This isn't God's way. His way calls for mutual commitment between management and labour. Paul says: 'Obey your earthly masters...always with an eye to obeying the real master, Christ. Don't just do what you have to do to get by...work heartily...keeping in mind that no matter who happens to be giving the orders, you're really serving God' (Ephesians 6:5-8).
- 2) Commitment at church. Many Christians have adopted a cafeteria-style approach towards church. We pick what we like and leave what we don't. But membership in Christ's church involves a covenant relationship with a body of believers who watch over, cherish, and pray for one other, and fulfil the great commission together (see 1 Corinthians 12:12-31).
- 3) Commitment to Christ. Christ is not looking for wishy-washy, 'lukewarm' followers (see Revelation 3:16). He told the crowd, 'If any of you wants to be my follower, you must turn from your selfish ways, take up your cross daily, and follow me.' That means you no longer follow your own wishes and will, you follow Christ and His will. That's radical commitment, and you are called to it.






We thank those who have already donated at the Jumble trail stall, but if you still want to make another donation do drop it into the vicarage marked Macmillan coffee morning.

Seasonal Events

31st October: All Hallows Eve – or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1st November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.
