The Sermon

Sunday 14th February
Speaker Sharon Yates
Theme Love one another

In the world love is often used without much thought, but love in the bible, agape love, is unconditional love and is a commandment given by Jesus at the last meal He shared with his friends.

We long for love, it is how we were created, but the many expressions of love in our modern culture are counterfeit and have hijacked the real meaning of love, the true love from God. The first person to love you was Father God; He has loved you forever and since you were formed in your mother's womb. God loves us and wants us to experience true love. So what is true love? This is the love we receive from God and the love we are commanded to extend to others. Note the word command; it is not an optional extra but something we are to obey.

How do we love one another as Jesus as loved us? We need to follow His example.

- He spent time with his disciples, special time where they went aside. We can give time to others.
- He comforted them when they were distressed and fearful. We can do this
 for other people when they are distressed and fearful.
- He prayed for his friends and he continues to pray for us at the right hand side of God. We need to commit to pray for each other; it is a privilege to pray in earnest for each other as an expression of our love.
- He corrected them. We can be called to correct each other or to be corrected; when we love someone unconditionally we want what is best for each other.
- He served humbly, doing little things that make a difference which are signs
 of a servant heart.
- He gave of himself; He gave his life as a ransom for many. Not many are called to die literally, but we are called to die to ourselves.

We cannot do this in our own strength, but because God's love is poured out on us it is there to be shared with others. With the Holy Spirit we can love beyond ourselves and serve the kingdom of God. It is conspicuous love, love is action that is seen and is honouring of God.

The Church Year



25th March: The Annunciation

The church celebrates the annunciation on this date, the event is when the Angel Gabriel visits Mary to tell her she is to become the mother of God's Son. The Annunciation is a significant date in the Christian calendar - it is one of the most frequent depicted in Christian art. Gabriel's gracious strength and Mary's humble dignity have inspired many artists. Certainly, Mary's response to the angel has for centuries been an example of good faith in practice - humility, enquiry of God, and trusting acceptance in His will for her life.

The church calendar is never quite as neat as some would like it. To celebrate the Annunciation on 25th March places the conception of Jesus exactly nine months from His birth on 25th December, but the latter part of March almost inevitably falls during Lent. But the birth and death of Jesus are intrinsically linked - He was born to die, and thus fulfil God's purposes.


28th March: Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to His own people in their capital city, and yet He came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave Him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into His path. They knew His reputation as a healer, and welcomed Him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah and put Him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.



The Persecuted Church



Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute speak up and judge fairly, defend the rights of the poor and needy.

Burma - Myanmar

When Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy (NLD) swept the board in Burma's 2015 elections after over 50 years of oppressive military rule, there was a promise of hope, the chance for a freer brighter future, especially for the country's religious and ethnic communities. Sadly the reality today stands in the stark contrast to those post-election hopes of 2015.

The civilian NLD government which had the opportunity within the constraints of the constitution to allow more freedoms, to improve human rights in areas such as freedom of expression, to repeal repressive laws and free political prisoners, has done the opposite. Aung San Suu Kyi's government has become an authoritarian government. Last November's election was held in a climate where many critics of the government were afraid to raise

their voice for fear of arrest and imprisonment. Aung San Suu Kyi, who once said that one political prisoner is one too many, on the eve of the election had 229 political prisoners in jail.

In the run up to the elections last November CSW senior analyst for East Asia, Benedict Rogers, explained 'Burma approached the crossroads of democratisation and national reconciliation and went into reverse.... . The gains that were made in terms of human rights have largely been lost. Today, once again there is the tragedy of political prisoners, refugees, media censorship, religious intolerance, continuing military offensives against ethnic groups and involving war crimes and crimes against humanity and most shocking of all, a genocide (of the Rohingya Muslims) that Aung San Suu Kyi herself went to the International Court of Justice at the Hague to defend. Most fair minded people would acknowledge the limitations she was under, but almost no-one would have predicted where we are today.'

Prayer and Action

But there is still cause for hope, as the Church in Burma has been powerful force of love across the nation during the Covid 19 pandemic. In crowded camps for the internally displaced persons, the church has distributed protective equipment, helped with preventative measures and sanitised the camps. His Eminence Cardinal Bo, Archbishop of Rangoon, told us 'Mercifully the camps are spared the expected spread!' and as the second wave hit, Cardinal Bo encouraged the church to continue 'to be a Good Samaritan to a wounded humanity' and reminding them that 'love has no lockdown'.

As we reflect on what lies ahead for Burma, we hold fast to the words of Cardinal Bo in the run up to the elections and in the face of Covid 19, saying 'During these challenging times, let us joyfully proclaim with the Apostle Paul, If God is with us who can be against us.'

Let us pray for a brighter future for Burma, especially in view of the military coup that has taken place.

Women's International World Day of Prayer



The Day of Prayer has been running for many years. The Women's International World Day of Prayer is an inter-church organisation which enables us to share in the thoughts of women from all parts of the world; their hopes, concerns and prayers. Each year the women of one country prepare a service which is then celebrated around the world on the first Friday in March.

Women of the Republic of Vanuatu (located in the South Pacific Ocean) have prepared this year's service. The black and white sandy beaches, coral reefs with coloured fishes, lovely birds, fruits and nuts in the forest, all make the islands a pristine environment, but they are vulnerable to frequent tropical storms, earthquakes, cyclones, tsunamis, and active volcanoes. Women, men and children of all ages are called to 'Build on a strong foundation' and live in unity, love and peace in the context of ethnic and cultural diversity like Vanuatu and so many other places around the world. The image was painted after Hurricane Pam in 2015 showing a mother protecting her child from the storm.



On Friday 5 March 2021 people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Vanuatu. The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 170 countries. It begins in Samoa, and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world – through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 39 hours later.

Bible in a Year 2021

Ross Haselhorst recommends that first time readers of the Bible start with the Luke, then Acts, Genesis, Exodus, John, begin Psalms (a few each time you read several chapters in another book) and Proverbs (one chapter each time you read several chapters in another book); Deuteronomy, Romans, (After reading the above, a person has a reasonable grasp of what the Bible is about).



However, hopefully a person will go on....Isaiah, Mark, Ecclesiastes, Hebrews, Joshua, Judges, Ruth, Ephesians, Job, Philippians, First and Second Samuel, the Gospel according to Matthew, Colossians, First and Second Kings, First and Second Corinthians, Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, Galatians, Song of Solomon, First and Second Thessalonians, Jeremiah, First and Second Timothy, Lamentations, Daniel, James, the rest of the New Testament, and the rest of the Old Testament. This recommended reading pattern above aims at presenting a "balanced diet" of Old and New Testament and the different literary styles.

Walk and pray for your community in 2021

Our communities have all been affected by the Covid-19 pandemic: our schools, hospitals, neighbours, churches, friends and families, so when we're out on our daily walk, let's turn the time to prayer.

That's the challenge from HOPE Together, which is encouraging Christians to walk and pray in 2021.

Rachel Jordan-Wolf, HOPE's executive director, says: 'Whatever time, wherever you live, whilst we're able and permitted to walk – let's walk and talk to the one who has the power to act and bring change.'

HOPE is bringing together resources and ideas for prayer walking from many UK prayer ministries. An app is also being developed to track where Christians have walked and prayed throughout the UK. This is part of a worldwide Every Home for Christ initiative called Oikos, which aims to take the Christian message of hope to every home on the planet over the next 20 years.

Coronavirus near Easter: still a good time to pause, pray and remember

When the UK death toll for coronavirus recently reached 100,000, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York issued a call to the nation. They asked everyone to pause and remember the victims of Covid-19. The victims and their families were 'known to God and cherished by God'.

Perhaps, as we approach Easter, we should consider stopping again and remembering again the terrible cost of the pandemic.

In their open letter, Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell had insisted that death does not have "the last word", and the Christian faith promises that one day "every tear will be wiped away".

God, they wrote, knows grief and suffering and "shares in the weight of our sadness".

Turning to the wider impact of the pandemic, the loneliness, anxiety and economic hardship, they then invited people to "cast their fears on God".

The archbishops said: "We write to you in consolation, but also in encouragement, and ultimately in the hope of Jesus Christ. The God who comes to us in Jesus knew grief and suffering Himself. On the cross, Jesus shares the weight of our sadness."

"Most of all, we have hope because God raised Jesus from the dead. This is the Christian hope that we will be celebrating at Easter. We live in the hope that we will share in His resurrection. Death doesn't have the last word. In God's kingdom, every tear will be wiped away.

"Please be assured of our prayers. Please join us."



Word for Today

Notes and Diamonds

This [salvation] is not of yourselves [of your own doing, it came not through your own striving], but it is the gift of God

Ephesians 2 v 8

To understand how God sees you, try to think of these two things:

- A five-pound note. What makes it more valuable than any other piece of paper of equal size? The wealth and stability of the government whose signature is on it. You can crumple that five-pound note up, step on it, even tear it in two and tape it back together again, and its worth is still the same.
- 2) A diamond. If you rub a diamond in the dirt, it's still a diamond, albeit a dirty one. But it has not lost its value. Now, we must point out that in order to truly appreciate the beauty of the diamond, you would have to get the dirt off it and then restore it back to its original lustre.

What's the point of these two illustrations? That your value in God's eyes as His redeemed child doesn't change or diminish when you get dirty, or stepped on, or torn apart by life and circumstances. That's because your true worth is determined not by your own efforts but by the price Jesus paid for you on the cross. There, the great exchange took place. All your sins from the cradle to the grave were laid on Him. And when you accept Him as your Saviour, all His righteousness is transferred to you. You don't have to strive for it; it's a 'gift'. 'This [salvation] is not of yourselves [of your own doing, it came not through your own striving], but it is the gift of God.'



Spring Harvest 2021 goes online

Christian festival Spring Harvest has axed its 2021 in-person events, saying it is "no longer viable or responsible" to host the gatherings at their flagship Butlin's locations. Spring Harvest continues to plan for events in 2022. But in the meantime, Spring Harvest Home 2021, the online event which has already been months in the planning, is set to be "bolder and better than ever before". Spring Harvest will now start online on Easter Sunday evening. According to Spring Harvest, Butlin's will issue refunds to anyone who has already paid a deposit for the 2021 in-person full event.

Mental Health Ideas for Uncertain Times

We may all have rather mixed feelings on reaching March this year. On the one hand, it is lovely to see the onset of Spring, and vaccinations and better weather may make handling the pandemic a little easier. On the other hand, marking a year from the start of the first UK lockdown will be painful for some, especially as many of us are likely to be experiencing restrictions or ongoing hardships for quite some time. We may need to find new ways to keep going, so here are some suggestions that draw on both science and Christian theology.

- Getting outside Time outdoors in a natural environment is very good for you – and you can't argue with the happy hormones produced by exercise. Attending to the details of nature can also inspire awe, which has been linked to positive mood, and increased life satisfaction. Enjoying creation can also help us connect with God.
- Looking outside If you are truly stuck indoors, try putting bird feeders outside your window so creation comes to you. This is also an act of kindness (see below)!
- **Lament & praise** The Psalms are a rich resource to help us express both our grief and our thanks to God. Try reading one or two each day.
- Journaling Keep a journal of thoughts, experiences or practices you have engaged with during the day. Constructing a personal narrative or story is now recognised as a very powerful psychological and spiritual tool for building resilience. It is also a vital learning tool that we can go back to when tough times return in the future.
- Acts of kindness Helping or encouraging someone else is obviously a good thing to do in itself, but it also has a very positive effect on the giver - spiritually, mentally, emotionally, and even physically. Whichever way you look at it, finding new ways to show kindness to others can be a very effective way to help ourselves feel better too.
- **Gratitude** Gratitude is another natural drug in a sense that can help us feel better. Try keeping a grateful diary, adding a few things each day.
- Laugh, sing, make music, dance All of these activities are deeply rooted in our physical and mental makeup. You may have forgotten how great they feel, especially in times of sadness, but we can learn from children who do them very naturally.

I hope these ideas may help bring us closer to God, each other, and His creation.


Have you done a strip for our motto banner?
