Message for the Month

Last time I wrote we were on the cusp of our summer programme. Despite the mixed weather, the events that were able to take place were well-received and commented on favourably by the community. Thank you to those of you who were involved and who prayed hard. We are so grateful to God for the impact He has helped us to make.

Building on our summer programme, we're going to be holding a special guest service on Sunday 3rd October to celebrate Harvest Festival.

Growing up on a farm as I did, harvest was always an important time of year in our small country parish. It brought the community together and was an opportunity to give thanks to God for His goodness and generous provision.

I appreciate that things look a little different in the 21st century and in an urban context, but that doesn't mean we can't celebrate God's goodness and generosity and invite others to do so as well.

With that in mind, our morning service on 3rd October will take the form of Messy Church followed by a BBQ. Please do be thinking and praying about who you can invite.

Jesus also had something to say about a rather different kind of harvest which seems pertinent as we prepare for our own service. At the end of Matthew chapter 9 we read: 'When he [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." (Matthew 9: 36-38)

Friends – we know that there are many people who are harassed and helpless and who are in desperate need of the Good Shepherd in their lives. Please do join with me in praying for God to raise up labourers so that we may go out into our community to bring the harvest in. We're now praying again on Wednesday evenings in church, so do come and join us at 7.30pm as together, we petition God to raise up the labourers and to draw many people to Himself. Thank you.

St Marks Harvest Donation to RAMP

Thank you everyone for your Harvest Support to RAMP (Refugee and Migrant Project) which is one part of Newham Renewal. I have included a section from the RP website which explains what RAMP does. I'm quite active, in actually collecting food gifts for RAMP from Asda, Tesco, and The Nationwide on Green St.

At this time of the year we also collect generous food offerings from several Newham schools after their Harvest festivals. This all goes to help the twice weekly food bank at the centre on High St North along with donations from Fair Share.

During the pandemic this service was absolutely vital to a large group of people in Newham and it was humbling to see people queuing up before the doors opened on Tuesdays and Fridays. Refugee and Migrant Project

The Refugee and Migrant Project (RAMP) exists, to put it simply, to support refugees, migrants and asylum seekers living in Newham, who are seeking refuge from disadvantaged conditions. Often individuals and families living in these conditions have migrated to the UK via difficult and often traumatic routes; their reasons for coming to the UK are usually formed around safety issues; many are scared and do not know how to navigate or engage with statutory requirements. Often they have unclear, undocumented, or not yet finalised immigration statuses.



Here at the Renewal Programme, our team of highly-skilled, knowledgeable and compassionate staff support those most in need and least likely to find help elsewhere. In doing so, they build strong community links and empower individuals using the service and reaching out.

The work protects those living in the borough, affected by displacement and exploitation, eventually leading to them being able to thrive and recover. The Refugee and Migrant Project has grown over the years, in line with community requirements and needs.


The Sermon

Sunday 5th September

Speaker Ben King

Theme Drawing Closer, Going Deeper John 13 vv 1 –17

We are exploring how God makes all things new and inviting us to consider our roles in St Marks. For our new sermon series we want to focus on drawing closer to God and to each other.



Imagine a triangle with God at the apex; as we seek God and draw closer to Him, by definition we will draw closer to each other.

Our starting point is that you are loved. We are made in the image of God and part of us is God's love, it's part of our DNA. The amazing love that reaches to the heavens, and is revealed to us in the sacrificed Christ. You need to receive and experience that love, it is the foundation of all things.

The passage in John only briefly mentions love, but the passage speaks of Jesus' love for us. It is the Passover feast, a context that speaks of sacrifice, and is anticipating the greatest act of love, when Jesus became a sacrifice for us. Marvel afresh at the love that God had for us.

In verse 3 it makes the point that God had put all things in Jesus' hands, yet he acts as a servant and washed their feet. Jesus chose to spend his last night in loving service, demonstrating his servant heart and his love for us.

In Luke's gospel account of this event he records that the disciples had a dispute about who was most important, yet Jesus in his steadfast and unchanging love served them in this way. He still loved them regardless nothing we can do can make Him love us less and nothing we can do can make him love us more.

The Treasurer: Peter Arnold gave the meeting a financial update.

Youth and Children: Sharon Yates reported that our young people are doing well. The primary and youth groups are now running during the Sunday morning service. We hope that we will soon have some pre-school age children to attend our Scrambler's group.


Churchwardens' Report: Sharon Yates told the meeting about recent clearing out and tidying that has been done in the church. The Persecuted Church



God is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think

Ephesians 3 v 20

Albania's first complete Bible

For those of us who are praying for the persecuted church, the story of Albania's first complete Bible is a huge encouragement. Back in the 1970s and 80s when we prayed for Albania it was really hard to keep going and to believe for change to happen there. Believers were cruelly persecuted and there were many martyrs.

Dictator Enver Hoxha actually boasted of his success in banning belief in God in his country. But Communism fell after holding sway for 46 years and now the first Albanian Bible has been published.

This was the culmination of many years of work, the end of a project which transformed the faith of the four bible translators, and a

moment of extreme significance for their country. The translation has been from the original languages by Albanian native speakers. Every couple of months for the last ten years, these four men from different faith traditions have met together. Each time they spend seven days of working from morning to evening. They discussed every word of this scripture translation, grappling with meaning, context and culture. Each verse was carefully nurtured into its new language. Their faithfulness is extraordinary and the Bible they have completed is already being celebrated for its poetry and beauty.

Altin Hysi, who leads the Bible Society's work in Albania, says "These translators are not just linguists but true believers in God. The Word of God is not just a piece of writing, and this translation, there is beauty in it, the language flows, it has richness and form, it has life."

The reason for this is that it was translated from the original languages; it would have been much easier to translate from English, but they wanted a high quality, faithful translation, and they wanted to do it properly. It took 10 years to produce the New Testament and a further 10 years to complete the Old Testament.

Prayer and Action

All the translators and Altin himself grew up in communist Albania - an atheist state. Religion was banned and schools taught that faith was wrong. It was only after the fall of communism in 1990 that missionaries were able to enter the country and the gospel message began to spread. The team that worked on the translation were all among the first generation of believers who came to faith in the 1990s.

Altin said "For these Christians to be trained as translators, to become the elite in this work, and then join our team, is a miracle. God's hand has been on this project. In the book of John, Jesus is described as coming from Nazareth, and someone asks 'can anything good come out of Nazareth'. It feels like Albania is Nazareth, we are small country with a large population. We came out of communism with no scholars, no tools and with a persecuted church. But by a miracle we have produced a Bible. In a relay every runner has not only run well, they have passed the baton, otherwise the race cannot finish. We have run together as a team, and passed the baton of God's Word to the church and to the next generation."

Oldi Morava was 11 when the communist regime fell, and at 18 he came to England to study theology and for 10 years was part of the Bible Society team translating the Old Testament into Albanian. He is now the Bible Society's Director of International Mission. Nothing could prepare him for receiving his own copy of the Albanian Bible. "At that moment it dawned on me the scale of the work, the sense of accomplishment and legacy. This bible will be used by generations to come."

Already he has started to use the new bible, "The language, particularly in Psalms, is closer to me in Albanian. Poetry is always closer to your heart in your own language, and it flows into your prayer language. Something spiritual happens in that context, which is difficult to capture in another language."

Recovering the Sabbath

THEOS

Understanding faith. Enriching society.

Faith-based think tank Theos has come up with key proposals aimed at helping modern-day workers survive and thrive despite both the current changes — and the major challenges coming down the track. One proposal suggests 'recovering the sabbath.' In a new report, 'Just Work: humanising the labour market in a changing world', Theos identifies three 'great disruptions' facing the world of work. Paul Bickley, one of the report's authors, explains: "The issue is not work itself, but rather what happens when we make work, rather than the people who do it, our focus. We are disconnected from a healthy sense of work, and severing the needed boundaries between work and rest has set us adrift. The biblical idea of Sabbath is an ancient answer to modern anxieties. It's time to rediscover it."



Humanising the labour market in a changing world

During the pandemic, increasing numbers of people have shifted to working from home, from in-person shopping to ordering online, having take-aways delivered, and watching streaming services instead of going to the cinema. But people working from home or in the 'gig economy' delivering food or online orders, have discovered they are being watched - and watched closely. Software fitted to home computers or installed in vehicles is monitoring when and how people are working.

The move to home working has meant an increased erosion of defined working hours, with 'the boss' able to make demands round-the-clock.

In response, Theos makes three key proposals:

- 1. First, a focus on a full work, rather than full employment, economy. Paid employment is the main but not the only form of work, and unpaid labour, such as caring responsibilities and volunteer work, need greater esteem and focus from a policy perspective.
- 2. Recognition of the human person as central to any healthy understanding of work. Investors, and first and foremost church investors, have achieved tangible changes through activism in areas such as climate change and governance. They should add clear requirements on the fair handling of wages, benefits, agency work, outsourcing and employee surveillance to the social criteria they look at within environmental, social and governance investing.
- 3. Recovery of shared practices of rest to counter our culture of overwork. Dissolving boundaries between our employment and our leisure exacerbated during the pandemic have negatively affected many workers. Overwork is literally killing people. For many, a combination of technology and the pandemic have broken the link between work and particular places and times leading to an expectation, even if it is only an expectation of ourselves, that we will always be available.

Wake up world!' - Bishop calls for action after climate report

The Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher, has called for immediate action on climate change, following the publication of the major UN scientific report.

He said: "The message of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's Sixth Assessment Report is loud and clear: 'Wake up world!'

"It is time to stop playing political games and take action now. We are already

seeing the effects of the climate emergency around the world - and it is the world's economically poorest people who are already suffering the most.

"So it is our moral duty, and a Christian calling, to do all we can to try to turn the tide.

At COP26 there will be an opportunity to act, our leaders must seize this moment and deliver real and impactful change for the future of God's creation.

"We don't have a spare Earth."

Word for Today

What's in a name? Everything

That men might know .. Thou ... are the most High over all the earth

Psalm 83 v 18

The Israelites called God *Jehovah*, a name they thought of as incommunicable and inexplicable. The name means the 'self-existing one'; the 'I am'. He was before all things, the creator of all things; an awesome but seemingly impersonal, unknowable being. However, God wanted us to know Him in a personal way, so in Scripture He added five revealing titles to the name *Jehovah*, five word-portraits to help us understand and relate to Him. The Israelites usually discovered the truth of these word-portraits during times of crisis and distress. And they'll encourage you, too, during your time of need.

Jehovah-Jireh: the Lord will see, the Lord will provide. Abraham was about to sacrifice his son when God provided a lamb as an offering in Isaac's place. And in response Abraham called God Jehovah-Jireh, the Lord who sees and provides. But it doesn't just apply to Abraham. The New Testament references many counterparts to the Lord who sees our needs and provides answers. Jesus said, 'Your heavenly Father knoweth...ye have need of all these things' (Matthew 6:32 KJV). Like a caring responsive parent, God sees His children's needs before they do, and provides the solution. Before their shoes wear out, their father provides new ones. They don't have to beg, bargain and plead. Maybe you're wondering how come you don't always get what you ask for. Because God knows what you really need – you don't!

Think about it: it's possible for your wants to be gratified and your *real* needs go unmet. Remember Jehovah-Jireh *sees* your needs, and because He sees them He will *provide* for them! It's that simple!



St Marks is, once more, taking part in the *Link to Hope Shoe Box Appeal*, which delivers boxes to Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria and Ukraine in time for Christmas. There are two types of shoeboxes you can make up - The **Family Shoebox and** the **Elderly Shoebox** - although there is only one leaflet (**leaflets available in church or from Julie**)

The Shoebox contents are similar and this year they have asked that each box should contain – gloves/hat,

sweets/chocolate (BB June 2022), soap and flannel, toothbrush/toothpaste, candles and holder, small games (travel size dominoes etc, playing cards)

Then please add at least five more items from the lists opposite -

Please do not add medicines, food, coffee/tea, out-of-date items, or literature These are banned by Customs. Also please do not enclose sanitary items or underwear, which follow strict customs regulations.

Please wrap your box in Christmas paper and attach a leaflet to it, making it clear which appeal you are supporting. Fill in the Gift Aid form if you are a UK taxpayer. Finally, please **add £3 to each box** which pays for the transport of the box.

As St Marks is not open often at the moment, please deliver your box to my house during the two-week period 17th October to 31st October (for onward transmission on 1st November). You may wish to telephone first.

If you don't feel you can afford to produce a whole box, do please consider making a financial donation, via myself or Ann Arnold, which will help with the contingency fund, transport costs etc. (If the people delivering the boxes come across a real need, eg firewood for a family, people in need of blankets they will provide these wherever possible.)
