#### Message for the Month

At the time of writing, we still don't know what the new rules will be after lock-down ends. After months of uncertainty, our current position simply brings more of the same.

With people putting up Christmas decorations early this year to seek comfort in the familiar, one of the things that has been impressed upon me is the effect uncertainty can have, not just on our routines, but also on the human spirit. If you think about it, uncertainty is a prevalent theme in the Christmas story too.

Joseph and a heavily pregnant Mary had to make the risky 70-mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem for the census. There was then the deep uncertainty of *where* the Son of God would be born. Exhausted and miles away from home, every door was closed to them except the stable.

Even after the wise men had come to pay homage, Joseph was warned in a dream about King Herod's murderous intentions. So, the family fled to neighbouring Egypt where they remained refugees until God made safe their return. At Christmas, we celebrate the coming of God to earth in the person of Jesus. But despite His royal lineage and divine nature, His life, like ours, was characterised by great uncertainty.

Mercifully for us, uncertainty is not the whole story.

The good news is that because God has come down to earth as one of us, because He is Emmanuel – God with us - we need not fear whatever comes our way or however out of control we feel.

In lockdown, in the pandemic, in all life's uncertainties, Jesus is with us. And more besides. Because Jesus is also our Rock. He has promised never to leave us or forsake us.

None of us knows what the future holds. But instead of inducing fear and anxiety, rather may our human uncertainty only bring us back to the One great and eter-

nal certainty, Jesus Himself, as we draw close to Him and He to us.

As we prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth and rejoice at God come to earth, may we know His sovereign strength in our weakness, His peace in our fear, and His light in our darkness.

#### The Sermon

Sunday 15th November Speaker Rev'd Ben King

Theme Gifts and Talents Matthew 25 vv 14 - 30

The gifts and talents we have are given to us by God to make us the sort of person He has created us to be. In the parable Jesus is showing us the purpose and pitfalls of how we use the gifts God has given us.

Part of the message is that the gifts and talents are for a purpose and we need to use them in God's service. The two men who used the money that the master had given them, and made it grow in his service, were warmly commended for their efforts. Whereas the individual who failed to do anything was told off for his laziness and irresponsibility; we do not want to make the same mistake.

When Jesus returns we will need to give an account of our life; He does not condemn for not being equal in our talents. However He will do so if we make no effort to use the talents we have, and we do need to make an equal effort to serve God in the way He has given us.

In the coming weeks we will be encouraged to reflect and to pray about how we can identify and employ the gifts and talents God has given us, and to heed the warning of exclusion if we do not put them to good use.

Our church motto for the coming year will be 1 Corinthians 12 v 7, where we are told each one of us is a part of the Body of Christ.

So as we look forward to the New Year we need to think about our place in the body of Christ, and what you are called to be according to the gifts you have been blessed with.

#### **History of Christmas**



The Bible does not give a date for the birth of Jesus. In the third century it was suggested that Jesus was conceived at the Spring equinox, 25<sup>th</sup> March, popularising the belief that He was born nine months later on 25<sup>th</sup> December. John Chrysostom, the Archbishop of Constantinople, encouraged Christians worldwide to make Christmas a holy day in about AD 400.

In the early Middle Ages, Christians celebrated a series of midwinter holy days. Epiphany (which recalls the visit to the infant Jesus of the wise men bearing gifts) was the climax of 12 days of Christmas, beginning on 25<sup>th</sup> December.


Cooking a boar was a common feature of mediaeval Christmas feasts, and singing carols accompanied it. Writers of the time lament the fact that the true significance of Christmas was being lost because of partying. They condemn the rise of 'misrule' – drunken dancing and promiscuity. The day was a public holiday, and traditions of bringing evergreen foliage into the house and the exchange of gifts (usually on Epiphany) date from this time.

In the 17th century the rise of new Protestant denominations led to a rejection of many celebrations that were associated with Catholic Christianity. Christmas was one of them. After the execution of Charles I, England's Puritan rulers made the celebration of Christmas illegal for 14 years. The restoration of Charles II ended the ban, but religious leaders continued to discourage excess, especially in Scotland. In Western Europe (but not worldwide) the day for exchanging gifts changed from Epiphany (6<sup>th</sup> January) to Christmas Day.

Father Christmas dates from 17th century England, where he was a secular figure of good cheer (more associated with drunkenness than gifts). The transformation of Santa Claus into today's Father Christmas started in New York in the 1880s, where his red robes and white beard became potent advertising symbols. In some countries (such as Latin America and Eastern Europe) the tradition attempts to combine the secular and religious elements by holding that Santa Claus makes children's presents and then gives them to the baby Jesus to distribute.

#### Cuba

Christian Solidarity Worldwide recently interviewed two human rights defenders, journalists Yoel Suárez and Ricardo Fernández Izaguirre, to find out what life is like for them in Cuba during the Covid pandemic. Both men have faced personal reprisals from the Cuban government because of their work, but continue to speak up for justice despite the dangers.



Ricardo's story - "As a journalist and religious freedom defender, I have come up against the government many times, from threats, to imprisonment, to

being prohibited from leaving the country. Right now the religious freedom situation is very challenging. Now we are seeing pastors declared 'regulados', that is forbidden from

leaving the country. We have seen how the Cuban state security has tried to intimidate these pastors so they do not continue to defend their faith. We have also seen an increase in repression of the Ladies in White, a movement that tries to pray and ask God for freedom for political prisoners in Cuba and for better prison conditions.

During the coronavirus pandemic churches have been forced to close their doors. The government have used this opportunity to attack pastors and harass them with fines and threats. We have at least two confirmed cases of churches being demolished."

Yoel's story - "I am a young Cuban journalist, I am a Christian and I specialise in issues relating to religion in the country.

The situation for religious freedom in Cuba has a lot to do with other freedoms, and with the limitation placed on these individual freedoms by the Cuban Communist Regime. Freedom of association is highly restricted and this of course affects the ability of reli-

gious associations to obtain formal registration and to operate legally in the country. In these ways the Cuban government tries to silence the Christian community and all religious groups.


In my own case I have been 'regulado' since February this year, which means I am prohibited from leaving the country. This is all for political reasons, because I have covered violations of religious freedoms in Cuba. I have also been restricted from reporting on religion. I have been summoned and even detained. Such as on 11th May when two agents from State Security took me to a house outside my municipality, blindfolded in an unmarked car and there they interrogated me."

Lord thank you for Ricardo and Yoel, please speak your peace into the hearts and minds of all your people in Cuba, in your name we pray.

#### **Word for Today**

#### **Christmas symbols**

'in Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace.'

Ephesians 1 v 7

Today, some people are trying to remove any public mention of Christ at Christmas, while others seem bent on secularising it completely. So let's look at the meaning of some of the Christmas symbols.

The small holly berries are thought to have originally reminded Christians of the drops of Christ's blood caused by the crown of thorns He wore on Calvary. The evergreen trees speak of the promise of never-ending life resulting from His resurrection.

The Celtic cross has a circle surrounding the intersection of the vertical and horizontal axis of the cross. Some believe it originated with St Patrick, who, upon seeing a round symbol of the moon goddess, drew a Christian cross over it — changing a Druid symbol into a new symbol for Irish Christianity. In the same way that St Patrick adopted a pagan circle and gave it a new meaning, so other Christians adopted the evergreen wreath and gave it a new meaning.

When early Christians changed the Roman winter solstice of the rebirth of the sun (originally on December 21), to a celebration of the birth of the 'Son of Righteousness', the evergreen wreath was adopted. Instead of simply being a garland, the round Christmas wreath now speaks of the never-ending unity and fellowship we have with God through Christ. So when you hang a wreath on your door or over your fireplace this Christmas, remind yourself that nothing 'shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord' (Romans 8 v 39).

#### Thank Dickens for Christmas as you know it!

Ever wonder where many of our Christmas traditions come from? A surprising amount of our modern Christmas celebrations can be traced back to the well-loved story of 'A Christmas Carol', by Charles Dickens.

When you read 'A Christmas Carol', you discover almost a template of the 'ideal Christmas' which we still hold dear to-day. Dickens seems to have selected the best of the Christmas celebrations of his day (he ignored some of the odd excesses)



and gave us traditions that we could accommodate and treasure – more than a century later.

So, in *A Christmas Carol*, Christmas is a family day, with a family-centred feast. In a home decorated with holly and candles the characters enjoy a roast turkey, followed by Christmas pudding. They give their loved ones presents. Scrooge even gives donations to charity (!).

And all the while outside there is snow and frost, while church bells ring, and carol singers sing hoping for mulled wine. In 'A Christmas Carol' there is even a Father Christmas – in the shape of Christmas Present. Only the Christmas tree itself came later, when Prince Albert imported 'a pretty German toy' that won the heart of the English court and subsequently the rest of Victorian society.

#### 10 ways to avoid stress this Christmas

- Change your expectations this Christmas. Don't waste time lamenting what should have been. Instead, try and enjoy whatever is possible this year.
- 2. Make a list. Include sending cards, buying presents and organising food for the big day. Having a list helps keep you in control of your life.
- Set a reduced budget this year. With a pandemic raging, this no time to take on Christmas debt. If you can't pay for it this month, it is probably best not to buy it.
- 4. Exercise each day. It releases happiness-inducing serotonin. That will help you to keep calm and positive over the festive period.
- 5. Don't overindulge. Too much alcohol and rich food won't improve your life.
- 6. Keep calm and keep kind. Urge your family members to try and avoid any flare up of family tensions. If you need to cry, cry, but then, keep on keeping on.
- 7. Remember those everyday essentials: batteries for new toys, toilet paper, milk, paper towel. Those things you never think about until they are gone.
- 8. Entertain the kids: plan ahead various films, games and whatever it takes to give them a memorable Christmas.
- 9. Make the most of Zoom this year with far-flung relatives and friends.
- 10. Most of all, include God in your Christmas! This is His Son's birthday include Bible readings and carols in your family routine over the festive period.
