As we embark on a new year, there are two things to which I'd like to draw your attention.

The Sermon

Sunday 6th December Speaker Rev'd Ben King

Theme 2nd Sunday in Advent - Good News

This sermon is based on Mark 1 vv 1—8; right at the very beginning of the gospel he tells us of the Good News of Jesus the Messiah. In this we are introduced to John the Baptist. John witnessed to the good news both in how he lived his life and in the message he preached.

Always John spoke of how he was a forerunner to Jesus, putting the spotlight on Him, and preparing the way. He was not living his life for himself. There is a message for us: we should not be living our lives to gratify ourselves and our desires, but in glorifying God. If that is at the heart of all we do and are, there is a freedom and fulfilment and it will give us the blessing of life as God intended it to be. We can experience a profound change in how we experience all of life as we live for Jesus as John the Baptist did.

Also what John the Baptist preached was good news. His message was repentance and baptism for the forgiveness of sins. There was a very strong response from people at the time. We also need to repent; like the prodigal son we need to return home to God, turning our back on our sinfulness. All our sins are washed away because of Jesus.

There is power in repentance; we may be struggling with patterns of behaviour and habits, but we can root out the sin in our lives with the power of repentance in our lives. If we confess our sins God is faithful and just and will forgive us. This opens up the way to God through Jesus and breaks the power of sin.

The season of Advent is about our preparedness to turn our lives to Jesus and hear his good news, so as to be set free.

Epiphany for today

This month we celebrate Epiphany, when we remember the Magi from the East who followed a star to find the baby Jesus: 'Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews?' (Matthew 2 v 1).

At the start of a New Year, amid the uncertainty of the pandemic, are we asking the same question? The gifts they offered show us how we can find Him in the uncertainty of the coming year: 'they bowed down and worshipped Him...and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.' (2 v 11).

The gift of gold reflects that the Magi saw in the baby a king, destined to rule over us all. In this coming year we need to remember that Jesus is on the throne, the seat of power and authority in the whole universe. Will we crown Him king of our lives and dedicate all that we are and do to Him?


The gift of frankincense reflects that the visitors saw not just an earthly king, but God in human flesh. Incense symbolises the prayers of God's people and so this gift reminds us that God is worthy of our worship and prayer. Will we offer our praise and prayer, as we seek God to guide us through the uncertainties of this time?

The gift of myrrh reflects that these astrologers saw beyond the baby's birth and life, to His death which would secure life for all. Jesus was offered myrrh on the cross and was a spice used in His tomb. As we face the sufferings of this New Year, we can be confident that Jesus knows and understands our experience. Are we ready to trust Him?

'Glorious now behold Him arise, King and God and Sacrifice! Heav'n sings Hallelujah: Hallelujah the earth replies.' ('We Three Kings').



The Persecuted Church



The Lord is a refuge for the oppressed a place of safety in times of trouble.

Psalm 9 v 9

Columbia

You might not think of Columbia as a place where Christians face a great deal of persecution and it is true that about 95% of the population are Christians. However, Columbia is also home to violent and powerful criminal groups and drug cartels. These gangs often recruit young Columbians, dazzling them with the promise of a better life. If that does not work they take children by force, and they do not like it when Christians try to stop them.

Plinio was a pastor in La Caucana; it is a dangerous part of Columbia, but Plinio knew it was part of his ministry to speak out against organised crime and help prevent young people from being recruited.

His wife Alba, remembers the day that her husband paid the ultimate price for his ministry. "I was working in the kitchen with some other women, Plinio had gone to the church to pray, and when he came back he sat and watched the news. It was a peaceful day" she says. Suddenly there were gunshots and Plinio had been shot twice, murdered in his own home.

Alba was widowed that day and Daniela 12, and Sebastian 5, lost their father. Children are often the forgotten victims of persecution, as even if they are not directly targeted, the impact of having your parents threatened, attacked, or even killed, can last for many years.

In 2019 Open Doors Partners were able to take Alba, Daniela and Sebastian to the Children's Centre, run thanks to the Open Doors supporters. It is a safe place for the persecuted Columbian Christians to find shelter, either as permanent residents or for a shorter period. The children receive psychological and pastoral support as well as education, community and fun.

Prayer and Action

When Alba and the children arrived all the children from the centre were waiting outside with a big welcome home banner and they spent four weeks there. Daniela says "I was really happy to be surrounded by many loving people, I met many children and learned that, although there are difficult times in life, there are times when Jesus helps us to overcome through people and prayer."

After seeing how dangerous the area was where the family were living, Open Doors arranged a new house for them in a much safer area. This was only possible through the gracious prayers and gifts of the supporters of Open Doors. Alba wants to open a sewing workshop in her home, and the children are in school and are happy. Through the trauma support they are moving on with their lives, despite the painful loss they have suffered.

Bible in a Year 2020 - Testimonies

Bibles

If you'd like to use a Bible you already have, we recommend going to https://oneyearbibleonline.com. There is a wide range of different reading plans, so you can follow one that suits your needs and preferences. There are also a wide variety of Bible in One Year Bibles you can buy, which put the readings in order by day of the year. The Bibles come in various translations, so you can choose the one most familiar to you. We recommend



The NIV Alpha Bible In One Year. If you find it easier to listen than to read, we recommend The NIV Audio Bible in One Year read by David Suchet. You can buy it on CD or download it.

Online and Apps

If you prefer electronic resources, we recommend *The Bible in One Year* app, from the creators of the Alpha course. You can get the app for iPhone or Android, or you can sign up online on their website to get a daily email (www.bibleinoneyear.org). With the phone app, you can even have it read to you! There's also a short commentary explaining each reading.

Books

Sometimes it helps to have a bit of explanation or commentary to accompany your Bible readings. We recommend John Stott's *Through the Bible Through the Year* - daily reflections that take you through the broad sweep of Scripture. To get a good overview of the story of the Bible we recommend *The Bible Project* videos, which provide great summaries of every book of the Bible. Visit www.thebibleproject.com or search on YouTube.

Young People

Our younger members can get involved too! There's a brilliant resource entitled E100 which takes you through 100 key bible readings in the year with a short commentary, application and prayer. If you'd prefer to focus on biblical characters, then Soul Survivor's lifelines is probably for you. They've also done their own bible in a year with YouTube commentaries: https://www.soulsurvivor.com/bible

Church of England News

We must become a 'simpler, humbler, bolder Church'

The momentous events of 2020 will have a "profound effect" on the future of the Church of England and our wider society, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have said. In a recent joint address to the General Synod, Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell said the Church of England must adapt and put its trust in God to become a "simpler, humbler, bolder Church."

The archbishops' comments came as they addressed the first online sitting of the General Synod following a legal change to enable it to meet remotely amid the coronavirus restrictions. They outlined how the coronavirus pandemic and its economic fallout are providing the backdrop to huge social changes - here and around the world. They also singled out how the Black Lives Matter movement and the publication of the IICSA report on abuse had exposed the Church's own failings and the need to change.

Archbishop Justin told Synod: "2020 will be a year that registers in memory and in history. It can be compared with 1929, with 1914, with 1989. "We are aware that this is a year in which huge changes are happening in our society and consequently in the Church. "For let us be clear, there is no possibility of changes in society failing to have a profound effect on the shape, calling and experience of mission in the Church."

"These crises are not signs of the absence of God but calls to recognise the presence of the kingdom and to act in faith and courage, simplifying our life focusing on Jesus Christ, looking outwards to the needy and renewing in our cells our call to wash feet, to serve our society and to be the Church for England."



Word for Today

Growth is more important than goals

'the ways of right-living people glow with light'

Proverbs 4 v 18

Phil Cooke writes: 'Growth is what we do with knowledge. Growth is where we take our knowledge, how we apply it, and how we use it in our everyday lives.

Leadership expert John Maxwell taught me long ago to change my orientation from goals to growth. When he said those words, it was a revelation. I'd always learned that goals were important, and I tried and tried to use a system of reaching goals, but I'd always struggled with it. I could see that goals motivated lots of people...but reaching goals always left me empty and unsatisfied. But when John showed me how to focus my attention on growth, everything suddenly fell into place. The process taught me that goals are great, but when we reach a goal, we're finished. But with growth, it's a never-ending process – always learning, always moving forward, always achieving. I hope when I reach the end of my life, there will be a couple of good books on my nightstand. I want to learn and grow until my last breath.

Look at the people in your circle of friends. Why do some succeed and others seem to stagnate? Why do some move to higher levels of achievement while others stay at the same place for years at a time? Many people blame the system, the company, or their boss. They blame society, their upbringing, or their past. But a lifetime plan for growth can break through barriers and overcome nearly any obstacle.' The Bible puts it like this: 'The ways of right-living people glow with light; the longer they live, the brighter they shine.' And the more they grow!



Asha Trust Update

Sadly, it is not realistic to hold a Gift Recycling event for Asha in January.



However, the need is still there, and much of Asha's work this year has been fundraising to pay for essential food parcels, distributed to those in Athid-ya whose paid work has totally dried up through the Covid pandemic.

A food parcel contains all the essentials to support a family such as rice, lentils, flour, milk powder, sugar, tea, coconut and soap. Each parcel for a family of 4 costs SLR1,500/£6 and we provide 85 parcels each time reaching at least 340 people at each distribution.

We need to raise £2,000 in order to continue with our food parcel distribution for the first 3 months of 2021.

Cost of Coronavirus

It is good to begin a new year with hope, but few of us have left 2020 unscathed by the pandemic. For example, nearly half of us, 48 per cent, put on weight during lockdown. (According to a recent survey by King's College London and Ipsos MO-RI). Millions of us turned to alcohol or drugs. Public Health England reports that one in five of us aged 45-74 are now drinking more than 21 units a week. The Royal College of Psychiatrists expresses alarm at the rapid rise in patients whose alcohol or drug use led to a decline in their mental health in 2020.

Children have suffered. Childline had nearly 43,000 calls from young people between March and October. Cyber bullying has soared, with one in three children being bullied during the pandemic, according to the Anti-Bullying Alliance.

For millions of pensioners, Covid-19 'hit the fast-forward button on ageing', according to Age UK. Lockdown left old people frightened and losing their confidence, mobility and even functions such as memory.

Suicidal thoughts soared during lockdown, with the number of people seeking help tripling, to stand at more than a quarter of a million. The Royal College of Psychiatrists warn that mental health services are now 'overflowing' with patients struggling to cope with anxiety, psychosis and depression. Many charities fear that there will be a 'second pandemic' of mental health problems.

So – what do we do as January 2021 dawns? Each one of us CAN do something to make things better, if only in a small way. How about these for your New Year Resolutions?

Firstly, just get regular exercise. As one professor said, "Exercise creates a virtuous circle of physical and mental well-being. You move more, you eat better, you feel positive." On the other hand, only a couple of weeks of lying around the house will leave your cardiovascular systems less effective, your musculoskeletal system weaker, your metabolic rate affected, and your immune system lowered.

Secondly, adopt the right mental attitude. Studies of Holocaust survivors found that those who recovered best had certain character traits of resilience: optimism, self-esteem, acceptance and above all, spirituality. A faith in God gave them purpose and meaning, even in the midst of fear and death.

Thirdly, make an effort this year to keep in touch with your friends and keep an eye out for vulnerable neighbours. Be willing to act as a safety net for others, if only to show compassion and a willingness to listen to them.

Traidcraft




Traidcraft has continued trading through 2020, but it lost a lot of business due to the impact of the coronavirus lockdown on many of their usual sales outlets in shops and churches.






