Thought for the Month

I hope you had a good Christmas and that your time over the holiday season was enjoyably spent. More importantly, I hope all those wonderful Christmas themes worked their way into your heart again as you marvelled at the glorious truth of Emmanuel – God with us.

As we ease into a new year, indeed a new decade, we might well consider what the future holds and what lies before us. Certainly, these themes have been exercising my mind over the past few months. In particular, what might God have in store for St Mark's and this community?

The Sermon

Sunday 15th December Carol Service

Speaker Reverend Ben King

Theme God with us

God in this. God with us. A starting point for the Christmas story.

We were reminded from Luke's Gospel that Mary had a surprise visit from the Archangel Gabriel and, as a young virgin, suddenly had to get her head round becoming the mother of Jesus, God's Son. Joseph was equally shocked when he heard about her unforeseen pregnancy and, quite understandably, wanted to break off his relationship with Mary. It was only another angelic visitation that persuaded him otherwise. Then there was the 70-mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem that Mary and Joseph had to make because of the census. And when they arrived in Bethlehem, they had the arduous task of finding somewhere to stay for Mary to give birth. A stable block was the best they could do.

On paper, it doesn't really make sense, does it? If you were charged with paving the way for the Son of God's arrival, is this the way *you* would orchestrate things? But this is exactly how it was meant to be. Through the messiness and uncertainty of that first Christmas, through its drama and high emotion, God's extravagant and eternal love for us was revealed. For this tiny, helpless baby, Jesus, is also the Son of God and Saviour of the world. Friends - God's in this. He's with us.

Well there's good news, friends. Because the central point of the Christmas story is not for us to gurgle over a baby in a manger, but to remember why God came in the person of Jesus at all. At the centre of the Christmas story lies the cross. Jesus' mission was to give up his life on a cross for all of us, all humanity. Jesus was born in order to die. It's on the cross that Jesus broke the power of sin and overcame evil. It's on the cross that He washed away all our dross and shame which alienates us from God. Jesus' death has reconciled us to God. It's given us the opportunity to receive forgiveness and with it, new life, the life He intended us to live, the life that deep down we've always wanted to live. Although Jesus' death looked like defeat, it was the ultimate victory. God was on the cross. God was with us.

Please note: This is what I heard of the sermon, it may have not been what the minister meant to say, do come and join us and listen for yourself Sunday mornings at 10:30am.

What we collect each month will be advertised in both the magazine and the news sheet. Please leave your donated items in the box by the church office.



Pastor 'Jabir', (not his real name) and his family narrowly escaped when his wife was followed home by an extremist.

They have had to move many times as a result of Jabir's conversion to Christianity, due to the threat to their safety. When Jabir converted, his former wife and children were taken away and she was prohibited from seeing his older child. He has remarried and now has two young children, but they are constantly on the move and it is taking a toll on his wife especially: she wakes up at night at the slightest sound.

Jabir now leads a small home church in his living room and travels to minister to other Christians.

Please pray that:

- God will comfort his wife and fill her with hope.
- For the family's protection.
- That their income from a transportation

business will sustain them.

• That the family and church will remain steadfast in their pursuit of God's love and his presence.

A court in India has ruled that five Christians be detained for more than 10 years over the murder of Sami Laxmanananda Sarawati in August 2018 in the Odisha (formerly Orissa) state. They were held despite the fact that Maoists admitted responsibility for the death.

Christian leaders have long maintained that they were framed. The murder sparked anti-Christian riots that claimed 120 lives and displaced 55,000 believers. Please pray that they will be cleared when the case comes to the high court.

In 2020, we're encouraging everyone to set a goal to read the Bible in one year

It's easier than you might think, and there's no better way to grow in your faith and relationship with God than spending regular time reading his Word.

There are many resources available, such as books you can buy from a local book shop or online. We can order them for you if you would like - just let

us know as soon as possible. There are also apps and online material available. On the next page we've suggested some resources you might like to consider.

Whichever you choose will help guide you through reading the Bible in just one year.

All the reading plans provide a reading from the Old Testament and New Testament, plus a psalm or a chapter of Proverbs for each day. Some also include brief commentaries to explain further what you've read.

You won't be on your own! We're hoping everyone at St. Mark's will take part And we'll be encouraging people to join together as Home Groups and in twos or threes (or more) to support each other and share what we learn and how God speaks to us.

There'll also be opportunities during the year to discuss as a church how things are going, and Ben and others will be on hand to listen and chat.

We'll be joining in too and praying that as we commit together to read the Bible every day through the year, God will bless and encourage us all.

We'll be starting this exciting project from 1st January 2020. And it will form part of our Re-Dedication service on 5th January. But don't worry if you can't be there - you can still take part.

If you have any questions, please just ask Rev'd King or the Church Wardens.



Bibles

If you'd like to use a Bible you already have, we recommend picking up a printed copy of the Bible Reading Guide, available at church.

There are also wide variety of Bible in One Year Bibles you can buy, which put the readings in order by day of the year The Bibles come in various translations, so you can choose the one most familiar to you. We recommend *The NIV Alpha Bible In One Year* If you find it easier to listen than to read, we recommend *The NIV Audio Bible in One Year* read by David Suchet. You can buy it on CD or download it.

Online and Apps

If you prefer electronic resources, we recommend *The Bible in One Year* app, from the creators of the Alpha course. You can get the app for iPhone or Android, or you can sign up online on their website to get a daily email (www.bibleinoneyear.org). With the phone app, you can even have it read to you! There's also a short commentary explaining each reading.

Books


Sometimes it helps to have a bit of explanation or commentary to accompany your Bible readings. We recommend John Stott's *Through the Bible Through the Year* - daily reflections that take you through the broad sweep of Scripture.

To get a good overview of the story of the Bible we recommend *The Bible Project* videos, which provide great summaries of every book of the Bible. Visit www.thebibleproject.com or search on YouTube.

Young People

Our younger members can get involved too! There's a brilliant resource entitled E100 which takes you through 100 key bible readings in a year with a short commentary, application and prayer. If you'd prefer to focus on biblical characters, then Soul Survivor's Lifelines is probably for you. They've also done their own bible in a year with YouTube commentaries: https://www.soulsurvivor.com/bible.

New Year message from The Right Reverend Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Chelmsford

Live gently and enhance God's creation in 2020

When I'm having a bad day I say to myself that one day I will be my successors' predecessor. I find this helps me put myself in perspective. It also helps me to pray that the decisions I take are not simply for the good of the diocese while I'm bishop, but will be for the benefit of future generations in East London and Essex.

As I pray for our diocese on the eve of 2020, I also wonder what our world will look like when the Bishop of Chelmsford writes their New Year message in 2070 or 2120. This past year has seen concern for the environment grow. Where once we talked about sustainability, we now question whether the fundamentals of our present existence on this planet are sustainable at all. We now tend to talk about climate emergency not just climate change. As this emergency deepens, it is the poorest and most vulnerable who are suffering most.

In October, I took my staff team to the Franciscan Friary at Hilfield in Dorset to learn how a community of Christians can intentionally adapt their lives to not only reduce their environmental impact, but also positively enhance their corner of creation. Their heat comes from biomass. Much of their power from solar. Their food is LOAF (local, organic, animal-friendly and fairly-traded). Their animals naturally tend their wildflower meadows How would our attitude to God's creation differ if we, like the Franciscans, had to draw our water from the ground directly beneath our feet? Please join me this year in seeking to live gently in the world and enhance God's creation.

In 2020 bless the inheritance that you bequeath them. I wish you a peaceful, gentle and sustainable 2020.





Word for Today

How to set your goals

My relatives stand afar off

Psalm 30 v 11

Discern who belongs in your life and who doesn't.

One of the toughest parts about reaching your goal is discovering that some of the people closest to you don't share it or want to be part of it. You can spend years trying to convince them. You may even be able to buy their short-term loyalty, but eventually they'll leave you, often breaking your heart in the process.

Paul wrote, 'All those in Asia have turned away from me' (2 Timothy 1v15)'Demas has forsaken me, having loved this present world' (2 Timothy 4 v 10). Can't you hear the heartache and disappointment in his words? And when God gives you a great goal, you may experience the same thing. Somebody said, 'In prosperity our friends know us; in adversity we know our friends.' How true! When disaster blindsided Job, he said, 'All my close friends abhor me, and those whom I love have turned against me' (Job 19v19).

David's experience caused him to say, 'My relatives stand afar off.' Solomon in his wisdom sums it all up: 'Confidence in an unfaithful man in time of trouble is like a bad tooth' (Proverbs 25v9). The truth is that people who don't respect your goal will detract from it. You can minister to them and try to encourage them with words that strengthen and bless, but if you insist on holding on to them, like an infected tooth, they will end up hurting you. Jesus told His disciples, 'If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, leave that home or town and shake the dust off your feet' (Matthew 10v14). In order to reach your God-given goal, sometimes you have to do that.

Memorial day in January

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day on 27th January marks the 75th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz-Birkenau Concentration Camp. One of the disturbing questions that arises from the horrors of the Holocaust is 'Where was God when the six million died?'

In his moving memoir, 'Night,' Eli Wiesel tells the story of an execution that the prisoners were forced to witness. Two men and a boy were made to stand on chairs with nooses around their necks. At the guards' signal, the chairs were kicked from beneath their feet. The men died instantly as the fall broke their necks, but the boy, flailed about, gasping for breath. Wiesel heard someone cry out, 'For God's sake, where is God?' In that moment, he heard a voice inside: 'Where is He? This is where: hanging here from this gallows'.

As we think of this boy dying on the gallows, we are reminded of another Jew, who suffered and died on a cross. As the crowd gathered around the cross, it was Jesus who posed the same question: 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' (Matt 27:46).

Jesus became a human being, because God wanted to identify with His lost and suffering world. He willingly took upon Himself God's judgment for the sin of the world, as God turned away from the Son he loved: 'God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God' (2 Cor. 5:21).

So where was God when the six million died? The truth is that God is present in our suffering, to identify and suffer with us and to provide help, hope and meaning to those who suffer. Whatever we go through this New Year, let's not forget this truth!



of the Rat with a spectacular parade, lively stage performances, dedicated celebration zones and foodie treats. Events are planned from 11:00 am to 7:00 pm.





Elithe priest saw Hannah's silent weeping and praying and thought she was drunk.






Back home, Hannah had a son, and she named him Samuel.




