# Message for the Month

When we read the Easter story, one of the things we often gloss over is just how *frightened* the disciples were on finding Jesus' tomb empty. The women arrived to find the large stone over the mouth of the tomb already rolled away. That was strange and shocking in itself. But far more shocking was the fact that the very person they had come to see was no longer there. No wonder they were frightened.

When I wrote last year, we were at the beginning of the pandemic and although it was deeply unsettling, we were blessed with spring sunshine and hopeful that things would return to normal relatively quickly. Sadly, that wasn't to be and a year on, I appreciate things look and feel very different. I know that for many people, fear will be one of the dominant emotions they associate with COVID-19.

Mercifully for us though, as for Jesus' disciples, fear is not the end of the story. The dawning of a new day, a day like none other, transformed the disciples forever. God had performed a mighty miracle and displayed His sovereign power by raising His Son, Jesus, to new life. No wonder the disciples' fear turned to ecstatic joy when they found that the empty tomb wasn't bad news, but good.

And the empty tomb is good news for us as well. Such good news. Because, whatever we've faced this past year, Jesus' resurrection tells us that there is hope and life in Him.

We don't have to be defined by our circumstances or our experience of the past twelve months. Jesus invites us to draw close to Him again and to open our hearts wide so that we might know that death-defying, life-giving hope only He can bring. The risen Jesus really does make *all* the difference.

In March we said goodbye to Nellie Antoine who died at the end of February. Her family would like to thank everyone for their love, prayers and support at this sad time.

She lived 96 years, and through it all, she maintained her love of family and God, her sense of humour, and her strong character.



Nellie emigrated from Jamaica when she was 30 years old, arriving in the UK in 1954. She bore the strong characteristics of the Windrush generation – ambitious, hardworking, and industrious. As the matriarch of her family, she led with care, strength, candidness, a sharp wit and with deep love.

She then became a member of St Mark's Church and looked forward to attending every Sunday without fail. Even after she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's in 2012, and her memory slowly began to deteriorate, she never forgot to worship God. She would often get her days mixed up and would wake up early and start to get dressed for church on a weekday or a Saturday morning. Nellie's belief and commitment to her faith was undeniably strong. So, it is comforting to know that she is now at home with the Lord.

## **The Sermon**

Sunday 7th March

Speaker Scot Bower, CEO, Christian Solidarity Worldwide

Theme Luke 9 v 23 Take up your cross

When Jesus calls his disciples we often picture a pretty image of the men coming to Jesus and leaving with him. But when you think about it, they left everything behind, their job, their home, their families, their security and their reputation. Elsewhere in the bible Jesus makes it explicitly clear that there is a cost, and you must count the cost. If you hear the call and choose to follow you need to acknowledge the cost of that discipleship daily. Jesus is issuing an invitation to walk with him; there is an expectation of action.

There is no promise that it will be easy, but Jesus does promise to be with us. He tells us that we should not worry about where our food or clothing might come from, and in Matthew the bible tells us 'The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head' so following Jesus could lead to homelessness.

We in the Western Society often equate blessing from God as being wealthy and healthy and having a 'nice' life. Because we have a lot we think we are blessed and those who do not have much are not blessed. But real blessing is the promise of Jesus and his presence in our lives, and many we think have no blessings because they are poor and persecuted know the presence of Christ and are close to Him and so are blessed. We have a cheap grace that we bestow on ourselves, and they have the costly grace, the treasure in the field, because they know Christ and walk with Him daily. That gospel needs to be sought again and again.

Our place as a church is to speak up for those who are poor and persecuted; we are one body and they are our family. We can pray, we can give, we can campaign, we can reach out to them with letters of encouragement.

We must remember individually that it is our cross, no one else's, so we should not compare the cross we are given to bear with other people's cross. Jesus told us **you** must follow me.



## The Persecuted Church



Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, Protect the rights for all who are helpless.

Proverbs 31 v 8

#### **Egypt**

For many Christians, persecution is experienced as the day-to-day reality of living with oppression and the resulting hardship. Release International's Jack Norman shares his experience of meeting persecuted sisters in Upper Egypt, and what we can learn from them and their families.

'For Christian widows in Upper Egypt, life as a member of a religious minority can be especially difficult. Already suffering from the day-to-day oppression faced by Christians living in these rural communities, the loss of their husband can take away the means of looking after and providing for their families.

When I met Martha (not her real name), a Christian in Upper Egypt in 2019, she shared

her recent history with me. Her husband had died a few years earlier and her world had been shattered - but not just by her loss. Soon after his death she was threatened and attacked both physically and sexually by men in her community, and she had to flee with her children, leaving everything behind, to find refuge in the village, where I met her. Thankfully, with the help of Release Partners, they are rebuilding their lives, but continue to be affected by the trauma of what happened to them.

Yet even in such oppressive circumstances, some of these sisters and their families have much to teach us. I often speak in churches from 2 Corinthians 8, where the Apostle Paul describes the Macedonian church as "begging" to give for the relief of other Christians, even though they themselves lived in poverty. One widow visited recently by our partners in Upper Egypt really brought this to life for me.

She lives in one of the poorer villages visited by our partners to distribute food boxes. When she saw the box being brought in by the team member, she refused to take the food, saying she knew another family who needed it more than hers.

# **Prayer and Action**

She said, "I still have some food left, but this family has nothing, so please give them this box instead of me." She was willing to see her family get by with less to bless another family who, in her eyes, needed the food more than she did.

Thankfully, our partners were able to insist she kept her food, and they visited the other family with another food box. This other family lives in very hard circumstances, with only a small stove and a rug (which they slept on) in their house. The mother said to our team, "God sent you in the perfect timing! Yesterday, I borrowed food from my neighbours because I had none to feed my children."

Our partners were able to help this family and also provide them with a bed and a refrigerator. The team member who delivered these asked if anyone would like to pray. The youngest boy of the family, aged eight, said he did. His prayer was short but very powerful. "Thank you, Lord, for you are kind and that you remember us, as you sent us a bed to sleep on instead of the floor." He may have been just eight years old, but he recognised God's goodness and mercy, and praised Him. May we do the same, in all circumstances!

# **Maundy Thursday 1st April**

#### Maundy Thursday, time to wash feet

Maundy Thursday is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before His death: the washing of His own disciples' feet (see John 13). Jesus washed His disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The ceremony of the 'washing of the feet' of members of the congregation came to be an important part of the liturgy (regular worship) of the medieval church, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

But Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion.

Jesus and His close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together - for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as He, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.



#### **Easter Hope**

"So many people right across the country are anxious about employment, anxious about food, isolated from loved ones and feel that the future looks dark." These are words from the Archbishop of Canterbury's sermon on Easter Day 2020. Who would have thought that we are experiencing the same uncertainties this Easter!

Yet the Easter story remains one of hope overcoming darkness and despair. The women arrived at the tomb on Easter morning with mixed emotions, as they came to anoint Jesus' body. 'But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away.' (Mark 16:4). They were confused, as they tried to make sense of Jesus' death. Their hopes were dashed with an uncertain future. In the current pandemic, we too are left asking: Where is God in all this?

The young man at the tomb reminds them that God is still in control: "Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him." (Mark 16:6).

The women had forgotten Jesus' promise to the disciples that He would die and rise from the dead. Jesus' resurrection is also the sure foundation of hope for us in the present crisis. He turns our confusion and fear into joy and wonder! We can trust Jesus' plan for the future of our world and lives, despite the fact that things can't return to the way they were: "There needs to be a resurrection of our common life, a new normal, something that links to the old, but is different and more beautiful. We must dream it, build it, make it, grasp it, because it is the gift of God and the call of God." (Justin Welby).

# New bishop for the environment appointed by Archbishop of Canterbury

The Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher, is to lead the Church of England's Environment Programme with a charge to lead bold, deliberate, collaborative action across the Church to tackle the grave existential crises of climate change and biodiversity loss.

Bishop Graham will work with the Mission and Public Affairs department of the Church of England, continuing the commitment to net-zero carbon impacts across the Church of England

by 2030 set by General Synod in February 2020.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said: "This will be a key year for the UK's approach to climate change internationally." In June, the UK will host the G7. In November, Glasgow will host COP26. The Environment Bill will be coming to Parliament. "Now is the time for bold, deliberate, collaborative action."

Bishop Graham said: "Responding to the climate and biodiversity crises is not a luxury in the ministry of the Church, but an urgent imperative for our mission."

Churches are being encouraged to raise their voice to speak up about the need to tackle climate change across the whole of society through the Climate Sunday initiative, starting by holding their own climate focused service.



# **Word for Today**

#### Why Pray?

Whatever things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive

Matthew 21 v 22

You say, 'If God loves me and knows what I need, why should I have to ask Him for it?' Because prayer means talking to God and listening to God, which leads to building a *relationship* with Him. Jesus said, 'Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you' (Matthew 6 v 33).

When your prayers are based on your relationship with God, your needs get met. When you love God and spend time with Him, His Word says: 'No eye has seen, no ear has heard, and no mind has imagined what God has prepared for those who love him. But it was to us that God revealed these things by his Spirit' (1 Corinthians 2 vv 9-10). Did you get that? God has a level of blessing in mind for you that your natural eye can't see nor your natural mind can comprehend. And when you pray, He reveals things to you by His Spirit. When that happens, your faith grows and you're able to receive what God wants you to have.

So develop a lifestyle of prayer – praying all the time, everywhere you go, in the midst of your daily routine. 'Casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you' (1 Peter 5 v 7). God cares about every detail of your life. So when you become anxious about something, talk to Him about it. And don't forget to read His Word. That way when a problem comes up you can say, 'Father, you said in Your Word You would do this for me,' then quote the promise and stand on it.



## Have you done a strip for our motto banner?


